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1. Scope

Section 18(1d)(a)(iii) of the *Controlled Substances Act 1984* (the Act) authorises a registered health practitioner to administer a prescription drug (not being a drug of dependence), hereafter referred to as an S4 drug, to a person if the practitioner is acting in the ordinary course of the practitioner's profession and the practitioner is authorised to administer the drug by the regulations. For the purposes of section 18(1d)(a)(iii) of the Act, regulation 18(3) of the *Controlled Substances (Poisons) Regulations 2011* (the Regulations) authorises a registered health practitioner of a class determined by the Minister, to administer an S4 drug if the administration is in accordance with the requirements of the Vaccine Administration Code (the Code) published by the South Australian Department for Health and Wellbeing, and provided that all the other requirements of regulation 18(3) are met.

The Code is published under the authority of the Chief Executive of the Department for Health and Wellbeing and is to be read in conjunction with the relevant provisions of the Act and the Regulations.

2. Interpretation

In this Code unless the contrary intention appears—

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health practitioner means a person registered under the *Health Practitioner Regulation National Law*, in Schedule 2 of the *Health Practitioner Regulation National Law (South Australia) Act 2010*, to practise in the health profession of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health practice profession as an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health practitioner, Aboriginal health practitioner and Torres Strait Islander health practitioner (other than as a student);

midwife means a person registered under the *Health Practitioner Regulation National Law*—

(a) to practise in the nursing and midwifery profession as a midwife (other than as a student); and

(b) in the register of midwives kept for that profession;

pharmacist means a person registered under the *Health Practitioner Regulation National Law* to practise in the pharmacy profession (other than as a student);

registered health practitioner means an individual who is registered under the *Health Practitioner Regulation National Law* to practise a health profession, other than as a student;

registered nurse means a person registered under the *Health Practitioner Regulation National Law*—

(a) to practise in the nursing and midwifery profession as a nurse (other than as a student); and

(b) in the registered nurses division of that profession;

S4 drug means a prescription drug (not being a drug of dependence).

3. Application

This Code applies to the administration of an S4 drug by a registered health practitioner of a class determined by the Minister, for the purposes of regulation 18(3) of the Regulations.

A registered health practitioner of a class determined by the Minister includes registered nurses, midwives and pharmacists and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island health practitioners

4. Administration of S4 drugs under the Code

4.1 The registered health practitioner may only administer the S4 drug(s) as specified in Appendix 1 to the Code and subject to the specified conditions; or an S4 drug that may be approved by the Minister and published on the SA Health website at www.sahealth.sa.gov.au/immunisationprovider.

5. Specified Immunisation Programs

5.1 The S4 drug must be administered as part of a specified immunisation program as published on the SA Health website at www.sahealth.sa.gov.au/immunisationprovider and administered in accordance with the recommendations in the Australian Immunisation Handbook published by the Commonwealth Department of Health as in force from time to time.

6. Approved training programs

6.1 The registered health practitioner must have successfully completed a training program(s) approved by the Minister for the purposes of regulation 18(3)(a), as published on the SA Health website at www.sahealth.sa.gov.au/immunisationprovider.

7. Approved organisations

7.1 The organisations approved by the Minister for the purposes of regulation 18(3)(c)(i)(ii) are published on the SA Health website at www.sahealth.sa.gov.au/immunisationprovider.

Controlled Substances (Poisons) Regulations 2011
Application of Part 4 of Act (general offences)—Part 3

(3) For the purposes of section 18(1d)(a)(iii) of the Act, a registered health practitioner of a class determined by the Minister may administer a prescription drug (not being a drug of dependence) to a person if—

(a) the registered health practitioner has successfully completed a training program approved by the Minister from time to time for the purposes of this subregulation; and

(b) the drug is listed in the Vaccine Administration Code or is a drug approved by the Minister from time to time for the purposes of this subregulation; and

(c) the drug is administered as part of—

(i) an immunisation program delivered by—

(A) an incorporated hospital; or

(B) SAAS; or

(C) a council or council subsidiary; or

(ii) an immunisation program delivered by an organisation approved by the Minister for the purposes of this subregulation; and

(d) the drug is administered in accordance with—

(i) the Vaccine Administration Code; and

(ii) —

(A) in the case of a drug administered as part of the *National Immunisation Program*—the *National Immunisation Program Schedule* and the *Australian Immunisation Handbook*;

or (B) in any other case—requirements specified by the Minister.

(4) In this regulation—

Australian Immunisation Handbook means *The Australian Immunisation Handbook* published by the Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing, as in force from time to time;

National Immunisation Program Schedule means the *National Immunisation Program Schedule* published by the Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing, as in force from time to time.
